Why are you a Lion? Surely it's a question you've heard before, either from someone who is curious about your service and your club or from a fellow Lion who is trying to find out what makes club members volunteer.

When a fellow Lion asks when you started as a Lion and when you became a Lion, we know they aren't talking about the same thing. We know they are talking about when we were inducted as a Lions vs.

when we really had that "A-ha" moment of what being a Lion means.

It's a bit trickier when asked why we are Lions.

Did you have an answer for that question? We all have an answer, but certainly most of us have seen that answer change over time as we spend more time being Lions and serving our various communities. It's only natural that the more time we spend as a Lion and become more deeply involved in our clubs that why we serve changes a least to a small degree.

Not only does how we view our service as individual Lions change, but over time our clubs change. We have to because the needs of our communities change. Sure, the core missions and focuses of Lions remain the same, but the boots-on-the-ground service of our clubs changes in myriad ways.

Our communities' needs change, so it would be natural for our service to change. The bigger question is whether or not we properly change with the community needs. Are we adapting to the changing times?

All communities have needs when it comes to hunger. Most clubs are right there trying to help in some manner, whether making monetary donations to organizations or hosting food drives.

The Hillman Lions Club has embraced helping the community's needs when it comes to hunger. The club holds pop-up pantries to help those who have food needs. The club's dedication to it has led to it being honored by the Food Bank of Eastern Michigan. The club will receive the 2023 Partner Leadership Award in April.

Obviously, hunger is not the only way our clubs serve their communities. The Oscoda Lions Club swings hammers every year, building ramps from mobility challenged people in their community.

The club has built over 90 ramps over the years, helping people who need to have easier access in and out of their homes. Last fall, the club extended their service by building a ramp for a woman who lives in a community without a Lions club nearly 50 miles away.

These are just two examples of why people are Lions. Being a Lion is an act of altruism, doing something for others without an expectation of anything given in

There are clubs that have members read to children at the local library or Boys and Girls Club, while other clubs take part in the Adopt-A-Highway program. Some clubs have members do spring cleanup for elder residents who can't do the yardwork themselves, or they might even paint an elderly person's house.

We do all of this without even thinking about why we are Lions. It's what we do. The best of us are always looking for ways to serve our communities while the rest of us say "OK" and roll up our sleeves and help fulfill those new ideas to help our communities.

So let's go back to that first question: Why are you a Lion? There are no wrong answers, we all do it for our own reasons. Those answers still aren't selfish because ultimately if we are active Lions we are helping others in a selfless manner.

I'll go first in answering my own question. I'm a Lion because I want to make a difference in my community, like my family has been doing now for 98 years of Lionism. I was inducted as a Lion in January 2010 and became a Lion the second time the same woman, probably around 80 years old, gave me a donation during a street sale and told me that her husband still remembers being helped by Lions when he was a child when the club gave his family a food basket during the holidays

So again: Why are you a Lion?

NEW POLICY ON ELECTING MD11 COUNCIL CHAIR

At the December Council of Governors meeting the District Governors voted to change the process for electing a council chair. PID Justin Faber introduced this new process as outlined by LCI President Dr. Patti Hill.

The new policy states that each year it is the responsibility of the incoming Second Vice District Governors to select a Council Chairperson, in order to meet the deadline imposed by Lions Clubs International and to allow for a smooth transition between Council Chairpersons, and to have a leader for the Council in place by the International Convention.

What does this mean, exactly? It means that you have the opportunity to apply and interview for the position of the 2025-2026 Council Chair during the MD 11 Convention in May! The seated 2nd VDGs will conduct the interviews and select their Council Chair for the term of 2025-2026. The Council Chair-Elect will serve as Vice Council Chair for the 2024-2025 term, under the leadership of Council Chair Elect Terri Huffman.

In December 2024, elections will be held for the position of the 2026-2027 Council Chair. This will allow for multiple opportunities to work as a team with your council while working together as the Council of Governors for a longer term than the typical one-year period.

Interested Lions may fill out the application form and send it along with a letter of interest to Executive Director Wendy Burns.

MD PROPOSED DUES INCREASE <

MULTIPLE DISTRICT 11 PROPOSED DUES INCREASE

The subject of a dues increase for Multiple District 11 was discussed at a Council of Governors meeting after it was recommended by MD 11 Council Treasurer Paul Hemeryck. A committee was appointed to review and make a report a to the Council of Governors with a recommendation. Based on the committee's report the Council of Governors approved the following resolution to be presented and voted on by the club delegates at the Multiple District 11 Convention Business Meeting to be held on Saturday, May 17th at the Marriott Sheraton Hotel in Grand Rapids to be voted:

Resolved That Article VIII Section 1 the administrative fund tax (member dues) be increased to \$12.00 effective July 1, 2024 with semi-annual payments of \$6.00 be collected September 10, 2024 and March 10, 2025; and Be it further Resolved That the dues be increased to \$14.00 with semi-annual payments of \$7.00 be collected September 10, 2025 and March 10, 2026 and each year thereafter.

This requires an amendment to Article VIII, Section 1 of the MD11 By-laws.

Currently Article VIII Section 1 reads:

Section 1. MULTIPLE DISTRICT REVENUE. To provide revenue for approved multiple district projects and to defray the administrative expenses of the multiple district, an annual multiple district administrative fund tax of \$10.00 is hereby levied upon each member of each club in the multiple district and shall be collected and paid in advance by each club in two (2) semi-annual payments as follows: \$5.00 per club member on September tenth of each year to cover the semi-annual period July 1 to December 31; and \$5.00 per club member on March tenth of each year, to cover the semi-annual period January 1 to June 30, with billings of the same to be based upon the roster of each club as of the first days of July and January, respectively. Said tax shall be paid to the council secretary/ treasurer by each club in the multiple district, except newly chartered and reorganized clubs, which shall collect and pay said tax on a pro-rata basis from the first day of the second month following the date of their organization or reorganization, as the case may be. Said tax shall be disbursed only for administrative expenses of the multiple district and only upon approval by the Council of Governors. Disbursement therefrom shall be by checks drawn and signed by the council secretary-treasurer and countersigned by the council chairperson.

The proposed new amendment would read as follows:

Section 1. MULTIPLE DISTRICT REVENUE. To provide revenue for approved multiple district projects and to defray the administrative expenses of the multiple district, a multiple district administrative fund tax of \$12.00 is hereby levied upon each member of each club in the multiple district and shall be collected and paid in advance by each club in two (2) semi-annual payments as follows: \$6.00 per club member on September tenth of 2024, to cover the semi-annual period July 1 to December 31; and \$6.00 per club member on March tenth of 2025, to cover the semi-annual period January 1 to June 30, with billings of the same to be based upon the roster of each club as of the first days of July and January, respectively.

Section 2. An annual multiple district administrative fund tax of \$14.00 is hereby levied upon each member of each club in two (2) semi-annual payments as follows: \$7.00 per club member on September tenth of each year following to cover the semi-annual period July 1 through December 31; and \$7.00 per club member to cover the semi-annual period January 1 to June 30, with billings of the same to based upon the roster of each club as of the first days of July and January, respectfully.

Said tax shall be paid to the council secretary/treasurer by each club in the multiple district, except newly chartered and reorganized clubs, which shall collect and pay said tax on a pro-rata basis from the first day of the second month following the date of their organization or reorganization, as the case may be. Said tax shall be disbursed only for administrative expenses of the multiple district and only upon approval by the Council of Governors. Disbursement therefrom shall be by checks drawn and signed by the council secretary-treasurer and countersigned by the council chairperson.

Born in Tuscumbia, Alabama, USA, in 1880, Helen Keller developed a fever at 18 months of age that left her blind and deaf. With the help of an exceptional teacher, Anne Mansfield Sullivan of the Perkins School for the Blind, Helen Keller learned sign language and braille. A few years later, she learned to speak. As an adult she became a tireless advocate for people with disabilities. And in 1925, she attended the Lions Clubs International Convention and challenged Lions to become "knights of the blind in the crusade against darkness." The Lions accepted her challenge, and our work, ever since, has included sight programs aimed at preventable blindness.




