DONATIONS NEEDED FOR VICTIMS OF CALIFORNIA FIRES FROM THE LIONS OF 4-C1 - CALIFORNIA

We are currently mobilizing to assist with the recovery issues due to the wildfires in Southern California.

Several of our members are on the board of the 'Command Center' to lend a hand in organizing and implementing our response to their needs.

We have received several calls and emails on how we can best be of service from here in the north state. What we are asking all clubs to do, if you want to send funds to help meet the needs of the Districts of 4-L2 and 4-L3, is to send those funds to PDG Sue Kerr and she will place them in our Disaster Relief Fund account and then pass ALL funds donated to the proper person in those districts.

The benefit of making cash available to them is that they will be able to purchase gas cards, or other merchants, in their areas for any of the other items needed. We found that gift cards are very much needed in this situation.

If you would like to receive an LCIF record of your donations you may do that as well. Please note on the donations sent to LCIF that the funds are for LA Wildfire Relief, selecting either District 4-L2 or 4-L3. Those funds will be sent directly to those districts. Gift cards can also be purchased with these donations.

Both Districts have applied and received Disaster Relief Funds from LCIF, but those funds cannot purchase gas cards or gift cards of any kind.

Multiple District Four has also received a Major Catastrophe Grant of \$100,000.00 for the areas affected by this disaster.

Your donations are very much needed. It seems as if they have received a great deal of funding, but it will not last long and their need is huge.

The easiest way to explain it is to incorporate a part of being a Lion into a game like situation. A game where people earn points or rewards like badges, titles or perks. It would be very similar to the games people play on a phone and move up through the various levels. I know this is not a totally correct description, but the full description would take much longer and will be the subject of a future discussion—maybe at the Forum!

Personally, I think it just another tool for our toolbox for Lions to enjoy being a Lion. Having fun and increasing satisfaction is the key! Notice a pattern here?

Lions Bear Lake Camp had an incredible year, welcoming 1,079 campers this past summer—a record-breaking season filled with adventure, connection, and personal

growth. From climbing towers to kayaking and gathering around campfires, the memories made will last a lifetime. Retreat season carried this energy forward, with crafting groups, school team-building retreats, and more making use of our beautiful facilities.

As we step into 2025, we have an exciting lineup of events. February kicks off with our Ice Plunge, a thrilling fundraiser where participants brave icy waters to support the camp. In the spring, the Wild Game Dinner on April 12 will offer an evening of delicious food and fellowship, followed by the Annual Workbee on May 10, where volunteers can lend a hand in preparing the camp for summer. Summer fun starts early with the Golf Outing on June 9, a great day on the greens for all skill levels, and the excitement continues with our new Clay Shoot Fundraiser on September 6 at the Fenton Sportsmans Club.

Summer 2025 promises to be another unforgettable season. Our Leadership Development Program will return, allowing teens aged 15–17 to grow as mentors and role models while supporting younger campers. These programs blend traditional camp activities like kayaking, archery, team-building, and campfires with skill-building opportunities that encourage confidence, independence, and connection.

For only \$40, a camper's family can send their child to camp, but the true cost to the camp is \$850 per camper. The difference is made up through donations and initiatives like the Sponsor a Camper program. Is Hosting Right for Me?

Are you interested in learning about other cultures and ways of life while sharing your own customs and experiences? Are open-mindedness, tolerance and cultural competence of high importance to you? Do you have a desire to contribute towards peace, international understanding and the creation of global citizenship in youth? If you answered yes to any of these questions, you may enjoy being a host family for the Lions Youth Camps and Exchange (YCE) Program!

Benefits of Hosting

- Hosting an exchange youth is guaranteed to be a rewarding experience because:
- You experience the joy of sharing your culture and daily customs
 You learn about the exchange youth's customs and culture
- You open a new world of possibilities and thinking to the exchange youth
- You make a new friend maybe a friend for life

Expectations of a Host Family Room and Board

You are expected to provide room and board for the youth. It is recommended that youth be roomed with youth of similar ages and similar genders. Meals should be balanced and healthy.

Transportation

Typically, you are responsible for all of the youth's transportation during the exchange. Travel may include but is not limited to, transfers to and from the airport or train station, transfers to other Host Families or International Camp, transportation to and from any planned activities by you and/or the Host Club.

Financial responsibilities

Payment for cultural activities is dependent on the agreement made between you, the youth and the Host Club. Some programs offer stipends or scholarships for participating Host Families.

Selecting an Exchange Youth

The criteria for selecting youth differs from YCE program to YCE program. Hosting a youth is dependent upon desired age, gender, interests and nationality and upon the availability of the youth meeting those requirements. Your local YCE Chairperson will advise you of available youth or if arranged early enough, may seek a youth meeting your request.

Host Family Eligibility

Potential Host Families must be screened by the Host Lions Club and YCE Chairperson. The Host Lions Club and local YCE Chairperson must approve all host families. Screening items include, but are not limited to:

- Age: Having experience with youth of similar age as the incoming youth.
- Character: Your family should be understanding, interested in other cultures, open-minded, tolerant and have ability to communicate and/or deal wisely with youth.
- Language ability: It would be helpful if one or more members of your family speaks the youth's language and/or English (most YCE programs require English as the preferred language), and could be necessary in some cases.
- Knowledge of the YCE program and policy: Your family should have some familiarity with the YCE program and/or hosting youth. If you are a non-Lion Host Family, you should be well informed on the scope and objectives of Lionism, and on the YCE program and policy by the local YCE Chairperson.
- Living conditions: Your family should be able to accommodate an additional



Youth Camps and Exchange Sponsor Lions Clubs

The Sponsor Lions Clubs are the resource for exchange youth to have a close working relationship with their district or multiple district YCE Chairperson. If a Sponsor Club does not have a district or multiple district YCE Chairperson, a Club President will be required to sign for the Exchange Youth along with the district governor, and to work directly with the YCE Chairpersons in the host countries of interest to make all arrangements. The following are general responsibilities for the Sponsor

•Ensuring that the YCE policy is followed;

•Ensuring compliance with local laws governing youth protection;

•Verifying the exchange youth have sufficient accident, life, personal property, health and liability insurance to cover all contingencies during travel to and from their host country;

- •Recruiting, screening and selecting qualified exchange youth;
- •Help Exchange Youth use the YCE Directory to find their desired programs;
- •Conduct an orientation session for outgoing exchange youth;
- •Assist exchange youth with travel arrangements;

Potentially provide assistance with or full financing for exchange youth travel costs including air fares, insurance, airport service fees, customs duties and any layover or overnight costs in route; •Maintaining communications between the exchange youth, host Lions club, host family and YCE Chairnerson

How to Become a Sponsor Club!

•Write a press release about the YCE program requesting youth who are interested in the YCE program to contact your club; and

•Contact local schools and universities, especially the foreign language or international studies departments, with information about the YCE program to recruit young people.






