



Leadership in Lions is not about holding a title. It is about what you leave behind in the people you served with when your term is over and your name is no longer on the agenda. The best leaders are not remembered for how many meetings they ran or how long they served. They are remembered for how they made people feel. Whether they inspired confidence. Whether they listened. Whether they helped others grow.

Across clubs, zones, and districts, leadership roles are often filled out of necessity. A position needs to be filled, so someone steps in. Sometimes it works. But sometimes it does not. And we need to be honest about that. There is a difference between a leader and a name on a roster. When we put people in roles just to check a box, or when someone takes a position for the title rather than the task, it may solve an immediate need, but it creates a much bigger problem later. A person who holds a position without genuine interest, preparation, or the willingness to learn ends up holding others back, even if they mean well. This becomes especially clear when it comes to committees and boards, both in clubs and throughout all organizations. These are not ceremonial positions. They are the backbone of decision-making and direction. They determine how well our clubs and organizations function, how clearly we communicate, and how effectively we serve. When those seats are filled with people who lack engagement or have not taken the time to understand what they represent, it shows. Meetings become routine instead of meaningful. Plans stall. Motivation fades. A committee filled with names instead of leaders does not just sit still. It quietly weakens the foundation beneath everyone else. Lions cannot afford to lead out of obligation. We need leaders who take these roles seriously, who prepare, participate, and understand that the choices they make reach far beyond the meeting table. Leadership requires more than presence. It requires commitment. It requires understanding what the role means and putting in the effort to grow into it. Not every leader starts with all the answers, and that is fine.

But there should always be a desire to learn, to ask questions, and to be accountable for the influence we have on others. Filling leadership roles with people who are unmotivated or unprepared does not just slow things down. It discourages those who are trying to move forward. Lions deserve better than that. So do the communities that depend on us. The strongest leaders do not always speak the loudest. They are not always the most experienced. But they show up with purpose.



People may not remember the details of your term. They may not remember the number of meetings you held or every decision you made. But they will remember how you made them feel. Whether they felt included. Whether their ideas were heard. Whether they were seen as part of something that mattered. That is what leadership leaves behind. Not a title. Not a plaque. But people who feel stronger because of how you led. That is the kind of leadership that builds clubs people want to stay in. That is the kind of leadership Lions need more of. And that is the kind that lasts.

Happy Thanksgiving, Merry Christmas, Happy Hanukkah, Happy Kwanza and More

As your GMT I am happy to report that MD 11 has a positive membership growth of 84 members. Our total members as of November 6, 2025 is 8270. Slowly but surely, we are increasing our membership. BUT we still have some work cut out for us.

Even though our membership is increasing, we are still losing members. The established members are exiting from the back door. Unfortunately, by the end of this year (2025) our numbers will drop again.

Let us focus on the reasons for the members leaving the clubs. There are quite a few (these are just some examples):-

- Not paying dues.
- Financial concerns for the family, (dues are not a priority)
- Not enough activities
- Cannot participate
- Too many meetings. Cannot attend. Too busy.

What can a club do to address these issues? When members do not pay dues, find out the reason or reasons. Can the club collect the dues every 2 months or 6 months instead of yearly. Can there be a payment plan? If they are good members (consider past history) and have a hardship currently, Can the club use extra funds from their administrative account to cover the dues just for a year or six months. (However, this trend should not be followed on regular basis for the same members).

Some clubs are not active. There is very little service activity. Members join to provide service withing the community and help others. If there is no service in the community, members lose interest. Also, get every member involved in the activity the club plans. Give them some responsibility. Make them feel a part of the Lions group.

As we all know, our club members are aging. What members use to do at one time they cannot do it anymore—it is not that they do not want to. They just can't. My suggestion is to also have some community service where all members can participate i.e. knitting blankets, hats or scarfs, or something the older generation can do at home. Get able bodied members to do other activities they are interested in.

Having many meeting and long meetings tend to be boring. Get to the substance of the meeting. Limit long winded individuals to a couple of minutes. Some clubs meet only, when necessary, in person. Have the option to meet in person and on Zoom or Google meets. Meeting times can be late in the evenings, after dinner, weekends or when it is convenient for the majority.

My Lion Friends, we need to stop members from dropping out. Gaining members is great but retention is a big concern for LCI. Can we help stop the member exit? LIONS MICHIGAN FORUM WELCOMES KEYNOTE SPEAKER, AUTHOR KATHLEEN MARCATH



Form 990-N (e-Postcard)
Use this form if the organizalon's annual gross receipts are normally \$50,000 or less

To *access and submit* the Form 990-N Electronic Filing system:

Sign in/create an account with Login.gov or ID.me: The IRS requires a Login.gov or an ID.me account to submit Form 900-N. Form 990-N filers should use the same email address associated with their IRS account. Note: Once the account is created, it can be used for future filings.

Review the **IRS Form 990-N Electronic Filing System (e-Postcard)** User Guide PDF for step-by-step instructions on how to submit electronic Form 990-N (e-Postcard). Most common problems can be avoided by following the User Guide.

Completing the 990-N form:

Only the following eight items of basic information about your organization are needed.

Employer identification number (EIN), also known as a Taxpayer Identification Number (TIN)

Tax year (calendar or fiscal filer)

Legal name and mailing address

Any other names the organization uses

Name and address of a principal officer

Website address if the organization has one

Confirmation that the organization's annual gross receipts are \$50,000 or less

If applicable, a statement that the organization has terminated or is terminating (going out of business)

For more information about these items, see Form 990-N: Information Reported.

Do not use a smart phone or tablet to file your Form 990-N. Form 990, Return of Organization Exempt from Income Tax

File this form if either apply:

Gross Receipts of \$200,000 or more, or

Total assets of \$500,000 or more

Form 990-EZ, Short Form Return of Organiza②on Exempt from Income Tax File this form if both apply:

Annual gross receipts are less than \$200,000 and

Total assets at the end of its tax year are less than \$500,000

990 and 990-EZ forms can only be filed through an "E-file provider". Use the following link to locate one:

https://www.irs.gov/e-file-providers/authorized-irs-e-file-provider-locator-service-for-taxprofessionals.

After clicking on the link, scroll halfway down the screen to the "Authorized IRS e-file Providers" section, enter your zip code and State, to search for a local provider.

Please note that providers may charge a fee to submit your 990/990-EZ.

Consequences of Not Filing:

If the organization does not file a 990/990-EZ/990-N for three consecu[®]ve years, the tax exempt status will be automatically revoked as of the due date of the third unfiled return. Revoked organizations must file Form 1120, U.S. Corporation Income Tax Return and may need to pay income taxes.

Additionally, penalties may apply for each day the return is late.

Record Retention:

Tax Records: In addition to the 990/990-EZ/990-N, keep any records that show the activities conducted, income received and expenses incurred, for at least 3 years.

Permanent Records: These include the application for recognition of taxexempt status, the determination letter recognizing tax-exempt status, and organizing documents, such as articles of incorporation and by-laws, with amendments, as well as board minutes.

Employment Tax Records (if applicable): All employee related documents must be kept for at least four years after the date the tax becomes due or is paid, whichever is later.

Scholarship Criteria:

- 1. Must be legally blind and provide verification (letter from optometrist or ophthalmologist or letter from vocational counselor). (A person is considered legally blind when their vision acuity is 20/200 or less in the better eye with best correction, or when their field of vision is 20 degrees or less in the bet-
- 2. Applicants must be a United States Citizen or have an F1 Visa. (Official proof required)
- 3. Scholarships will be awarded with PRIORITY given: 1st to Michigan residents, 2nd other state residents (state ID required), and 3rd international residents with an F1 visa.

Lions of Michigan FOUNDATION 2025-2026 Officers



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The Lions of Michigan Foundation is a public charity that was created in 1984 to help Michigan Lions Clubs provide community services.

We work in partnership with our member Lions Clubs and other organizations to provide disadvantaged individuals and families with access to affordable medical care and services designed to help improve their quality of life.

Through screening, diagnosis, treatment, education and research, we primarily help underserved populations and financially struggling individuals who require assistance with eye care, hearing aids or an unexpected life event. Our services are offered statewide with a focus on helping Michigan residents succeed academically, develop normally, maintain independence and prosper in life.

Through our KidSight Program, we aim to identify and help restore normal vision to children suffering from undiagnosed vision disorders that affect their ability to perform in school and develop on pace with their classmates. Our hi-tech mobile vision screeners are programmed to quickly and accurately identify vision disorders such as myopia (nearsightedness), hyperopia (farsightedness), anisometropia (unequal refraction power), astigmatism (optical defect), anisocoria (unequal pupil size) and strabismus (gaze deviations) through non-invasive testing.

Through our Hearing Screening Program, our objective is to identify and treat hearing problems before they impede a child's learning and development and negatively impact a child or adult's quality of life. Untreated hearing loss will interfere with a child's ability to learn and may cause behavioral issues that will disrupt their academic success and social development, and among older adults, untreated hearing loss is the third highest disabling condition after arthritis and hypertension.

Through our Lions Affordable Hearing Aid Program, we help low-income people with hearing loss maintain self-sufficiency through the provision of affordable hearing aids and audiology services. One in every ten people in our state suffers from hearing loss, which can only be treated with amplification, and without financial help, many people in Michigan cannot afford hearing aids.

Through our Emergency Individual Assistance Program, we help uninsured and underinsured people who suffer from severe vision and hearing disorders that can only be corrected through surgical intervention or costly medical procedures. Our service agreements and partnerships with ophthalmology groups and medical service providers throughout Michigan ensure that program resources are used efficiently and effectively and that clients receive exceptional care at affordable costs. Funding is determined based on the overall financial and medical needs of the applicant.

Through our Emergency Military Family and Veterans Relief Program, we help current and former military members and their families with financial emergencies. Funding is determined through an application process, and it is based on the financial needs of the applicant.

Through our Emergency Disaster Relief Program, we help people and families affected by natural disasters, including severe storms, flooding, fires and tornados. Funding is determined by the number of individuals and families affected by the disaster and the overall amount of losses incurred.

Through Donor Advised Funds, we partner with individuals, families, businesses and other non-profit organizations to provide charitable services that are important to the fund's primary donor or donors. Our status as a 501(c)(3) Public Charity allows us to create Donor Advised Funds that others can operate like their own family, private or corporate foundation. All contributions are tax-deductible; and we are responsible for sending receipts to the donors, disbursing funds at the donor's request, and reporting information to the IRS and other government agencies. Tax attorneys and accountants are not needed, donors simply contribute to the fund and decide what grants to make.




