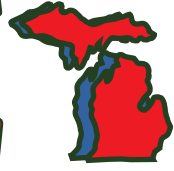

Lion Veterans in Service DG Rod and Lion Marie Leathers



Their story begins in 1977 when Rod Leathers enlisted in the Air Force in Williamsport, Pennsylvania. After the familiar stop for many Air Force veterans at Lackland AFB in San Antonio, Texas he then went to Tech School at Keesler AFB in Biloxi, Mississippi where he was trained as an Inertial Navigation/Doppler Radar System Specialist. He was then sent to Rhein-Main Air Base in Frankfurt, Germany on a two year tour. He loved being stationed in Germany and extended his tour an additional two years, so he was scheduled for a change of station in 1982.....

Marie Litwaitis, from Holton, Michigan, enlisted in the Air Force in 1981. She was all set to go to college but had a longing to get out and see the world. Fresh out of high school she was off to Lackland AFB, then Keesler AFB where she trained as an Inertial Navigation/Doppler Radar System Specialist and - you guessed it - got stationed at Rhein Main AB in Germany.

And here's where things start to get interesting.....while Marie was in Tech School, Rod, still at Rhein Main, ended up as an interim shop chief at the rank of Staff Sergeant until the new shop chief arrived. The branch chief received a long list of incoming technicians - all of them straight out of tech school. They simply couldn't handle training that many new recruits at one time so the branch chief started crossing off names from the bottom up. He had to give the list to Rod to sign since he was acting shop chief, and Rod noticed there were 2 women that had been crossed out, simply because that was the order they were in. Rod asked his branch chief if it mattered which recruits got canceled, and since it really didn't matter Rod literally erased the line through Marie's name.

Meanwhile Marie was in Tech school, where every week all the students would look at the assignment board to see where they were going. There was a long list of them going to Rhein Main, and then they started getting canceled, from the bottom up.....Marie couldn't believe it when it skipped over her name and she was really going to go to Germany.

And then things get even more interesting.... when Marie got to Germany Rod would have been her supervisor, so they most likely wouldn't have dated, but before she got there the shop split into two separate shops, so they didn't actually end up working together. They were married in 1983, had four children, will be celebrating their 40th wedding anniversary in February of 2023, and have been serving together ever since.

Rod's military service included many adventures, especially while serving in the Special Ops Squadron in Germany. For Rod that was

an exciting time of his career. He got to visit many places in Europe and North Africa. There were some places he went where he didn't even know where he was. Some of Rod's most unique experiences were when they were flying low level missions in the MC-130E aircraft at 500 feet. They would open the back ramp of the airplane, put on harnesses and sit on the end of the ramp. Rod remembers one time sitting on the ramp flying over Egypt and taking pictures of their sister aircraft flying around the Pyramids. Then they flew up the Nile River and out over the Mediterranean Sea, then over the flight deck of the USS Eisenhower without them knowing they were there. It was rewarding and fun doing joint exercises with the other military branches. He also got to work alongside members of foreign military learning how to work together. Wow that's like Together We Can. It goes right back to International President Brian Sheehan's motto Together We Can. Rod also was stationed at Nellis AFB in Las Vegas Nevada., and retired after 20 years of service to his country at Davis Monthan AFB in Tucson Arizona.

While Marie's service began with serving her country, her service to country took on a different role when they decided to have a family. Because of the nature of their jobs, it was highly likely they could both be sent off to war at the same time - and they didn't want to take that chance. They decided Marie would take an honorable discharge and take on the role of military spouse as they raised their son and three daughters. Sometimes life was just like that of any other couple raising a family. But there were times when Rod would leave for days or months at a time, and sometimes only on a moment's notice. She may or may not have known where he was even going or when or even if he would be back.

On the positive side there were times Marie could travel with Rod, like when he was on assignment to England for a month and Marie was able to take the

kids and stay with her sister who lived only a few hours away from where Rod was working. Together they enjoyed adventures like skiing in the Alps (they're a little bit steeper than Shanty Creek), spending Rod's birthday at the real Oktoberfest in Munich, and being part of history when the whole family rode the troop train to Berlin equipped with hammers and chisels and helped tear down that Berlin wall. These memories were made possible because of the path of service they chose.

They both agree that the hardest part of military life was missing so many things with their families back home. Your military comrades become your family because that's what you need to do to survive. When you're a veteran and have the opportunity to live in and visit many other countries it makes you realize there is no place like home. But it also makes you realize there is so much help needed around the world. Maybe that's why so many veterans become Lions, looking for a way to continue serving people in need all over the world. And there is no other Service Organization that can do it like the Lions.

CHURCH BELLS WILL RING...

...on Friday, November 11th, at 11:00 a.m., as they have every year since the Armistice went into effect at the end of World War I. We now call it Veterans Day, in honor of all veterans who have served in all wars, police actions, or other conflicts in our nation's history. We look upon our heroes with reverence, such citizen soldiers as Audie Murphy in WWII, and Joshua Lawrence Chamberlain in the Civil War.

They are examples of what one person can do! Sgt. Audie Murphy was credited with single-handedly stopping a German Tank attack and killing or wounding about 50 German soldiers in World War II. He received a Medal of Honor!

Col. Chamberlain was in command of the 20th Maine Regiment and was ordered to hold the left end of the Union line on Little Round Top at Gettysburg on July 2, 1863. Two regiments of Alabama soldier made repeated attacks on their position. When his men ran out of ammunition, Chamberlain had a decision to make: Should he retreat, surrender, or what? He had no military experience and had been a professor of diction (speech) at a college in Maine prior to the rebellion. He gave the order to "Fix Bayonets, Charge" and his men followed him down the hill. Seeing this, the Rebels assumed that reinforcements must be behind the charging Yanks and began to flee. A large number of Rebels were killed, wounded, or captured, and the day was saved for the Union. This is often used as an example of what one person can do to accomplish great feats. But let's not forget, there were 358 brave men who followed orders and charged with only their bayonets! All who served deserve the credit!!!

Napoleon Bonaparte is credited with saying "An army moves on its stomach" thus recognizing the importance of the cooks and the waggoneers who brought the supplies. So on this Veterans Day remember the sacrifices of all who served, in whatever capacity! I would even extend thanks to those who served in wartime manufacturing or otherwise contributed to the war effort!

November is also the time when we celebrate a true American Holiday – Thanksgiving! It was first designated as a holiday by President Abraham Lincoln, in response to a letter written to him by a citizen named Sarah Josepha Hale following the Union victories at Gettysburg and Vicksburg on July 3rd and July 4th of 1863. It is a time to reflect upon our many blessings and give thanks to God for our Country and the freedoms and prosperity we enjoy, and for our families. The retailers would have you jump from Halloween to Christmas, with little recognition for Thanksgiving. As for me and my house, we will not put-up Christmas decorations until after Thanksgiving! 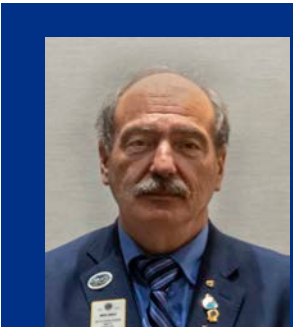
The funeral home where his service was held was filled with family, friends, and fellow Lions. Remembrances and testimonials given during the service were a reminder of the car-

The Mindset of Changing What We Do!

Many of us understand how to bring success to our organization. Or, at least we think we do. We jump into a service project, leadership project or maybe a membership project and... Well the "and" is quite sincerely, work our butt off. At the end of the day we end up tired. FUN (remember that Friendly, Upbeat & Nice thing) was not really in the offering. If we are successful and sustainable and you are happy with that tired feeling, great. Carry on.

Do we frequently end up with a committee of one though? Do service projects seem like a struggle? Is there typically something missing that seems impossible to solve? Ever heard someone say that we are too old? Have we hit a yes on any of the preceding questions?

Alright, let's get a bit closer to home. How are our Michigan districts doing? Gaining members comfortably? Are we above the magic 1250 membership level? Do we have a lineup of people running for second vice district governor? At our district cabinet meetings do we hear a full report with goals met or progressing for each committee report? Any one of these a "no"?

Many of our districts are run the same way today as when I joined Lions 28 years ago. We do the same things, even though times have changed. At the least, we have gotten older! The realization of FUN is not tied to age. It is tied to our attitude of the moment and how we approach it. In the Build a Vision process Lions International has a quote by Henry Ford. It is stated here as I learned it many years ago, so forgive the change!

"If you always do as you always did, you will always get what you always got"

Most of us would say that this saying is obvious even though the grammar is lacking. Yet do we embrace it? Do we live it with an attitude of change from lessons learned? Many districts do membership, leadership, and service the same way they always have. Some even argue against making any changes. If we are successful, we would all agree. Carry on! However, we see declining numbers in many districts. We see loss of service due to declining membership. We see the drudgery of getting someone to fulfill the office of second vice district governor. District committees are often a person that has several committees assigned and there are no written goals.

Here is recipe for starting a change. As a Lion there is every likelihood that you could add to it.

- Follow the GMA Process (It is a process that applies to all Lions endeavors including membership.) Take the time to know and understand it. Support your district GAT team and encourage them to follow the process. It should have already started in your district. It is one of the best team tools ever developed.
- Make written goals and report them as custom goals for any position or committee you are involved in. We know by experience that if it is not written, chances are it won't be done.
- If you are going to be on a committee (Well done, as service is what we do!) be the one to collaborate with the other Lions on the committee on a frequent basis.
- Report (in MyLion) all of the service that you do.
- Be an example to other Lions and the community of what our accomplishments are in Facebook and social media before and after events.
- Tell others the Joy of Being a Lion! It is amazing how much this helps our own attitude when we do this!
- Be humble and generous.
- Remember our two tools of working with others is positivity and encouragement.
- And insist on having FUN!

Lions, as we enter the Thanksgiving season, my challenge is to be generous in service and follow the above points.

Color blindness is hereditary issue that can affect the eyes ability to distinguish color or color differentiation. It can have several different degrees. There is red, green; blue, black; yellow, red; moving through the color spectrum as far as leaving ones vision ability to only see everything in black and white. There are some screening test available but it's not a screening currently done through our KidSight program. Our recommendation is to have the person referred to an ophthalmologist for a complete exam.

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MD11 READING ACTION PROGRAM

TAKING UP THE CHALLENGE! by Donald Spinks MD11 RAP



LIONS HAVE TAKEN UP THE CHALLENGE OF PROMOTING READING WORLDWIDE.

Lions have taken up the challenge of promoting reading worldwide. Here is an article that I found on the Reading Action Program that I would like to share with you and your lions club. It is important work, aimed at helping lift millions of people out of hardship. Learning to read lets people acquire the skills and knowledge they need "to overcome poverty, disease and other social ills," said Past International President Wayne A. Madden, who served from 2012 to 2013. Literacy, he said, is "a gift Lions can give to children and adults around the world."

Globally, nearly 1 billion adults cannot read and write. The issue isn't just a challenge for developing regions, either. In the United States, 21 million people can't read, and millions more have reading skills so limited that they have difficulty with common tasks such as reading signs or workplace instructions.

The Reading Action Program, launched in 2012, is a 10-year Lions commitment to focus on strengthening global literacy. The program calls for Lions and Leos to organize service projects and activities that underscore the importance of reading.

Lions clubs around the world have responded with a broad variety of community-based, person-to-person efforts. Some have helped develop after-school reading programs. Others have volunteered to read to children at local libraries, work as reading tutors or donate books and computers. Whatever the project, Lions say the work is deeply satisfying.

"I get tears in my eyes when I see these children improving their reading on a daily basis. It's worth my time indeed," said Jean-Marie Willem, a member of the Bruxelles Saint Hubert Lions Club in Belgium, which created an after-hours school reading program staffed by Lion volunteers.

In Hawaii, the West Kauai Lions Club holds bingo games for kids. The prize? A book. "It's a good project, because it promotes reading," said club member Charles Ortiz.

The Nagoya West Lions Club in Japan teamed up with the Makati Golden Lions of metropolitan Manila to build a library for children in the Philippines, then donated new computers and educational software. "Computers are necessary nowadays," said Shinzo Suzuki, a member of the Nagoya West Club. "So I like (young people) to study or get more knowledge about computer use."

Many reading efforts tie in with Lions' longstanding efforts to help people with visual impairments. Leos and Lions from Multiple District 107 in Finland recorded stories, fairy tales and poems, then published the recordings online so children with visual impairments could listen.

The Montclare Elmwood Park Lions Club in suburban Chicago, Illinois, USA, held a reading carnival for more than 100 children, treating them to story time, a puppet theater, face painting, crafts, balloon twisting and snacks.

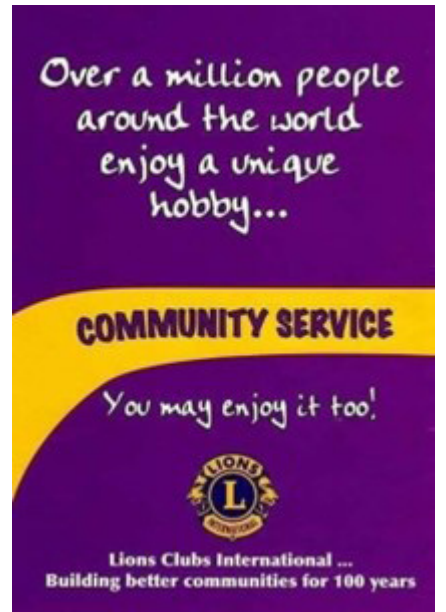
To increase the literacy program's impact, Lions have joined forces with other organizations that have the same goal, including Reading is Fundamental, the largest children's literacy nonprofit organization in the U.S. And at the 2012 International Convention in Busan, South Korea, Lions announced a partnership with the U.S. Agency for International Development's global literacy campaign, saying USAID and Lions both believe that "literacy is critical to the future of all children." I do hope that you enjoyed this article and that it inspires you to go read to children and create your own club reading action program.



COMMUNITY SERVICE ORGANIZATIONS COLLABORATE TO HELP FOSTER CARE CHILDREN - PDG CONNIE SHELTON MD11

Rochester, MI - Rochester Rotary, Rochester Kiwanis, Rochester Lions Club and Rochester Hills Lions Club worked together to celebrate and give back to the community with a joint service event, held September 11-30. The project focused on collecting new underwear, socks, diapers, and pajamas for children in the foster care system.

"Imagine the difference we can make when we harness the power of our four service organizations, all of whom share a passion for taking action and creating lasting change," said Rotary President Tim Duncan. Kiwanis President Chuck Bissell said, "We looked around for a project that would serve children in particular and decided to focus on foster children this year." Foster care is a temporary living situation for children whose parents cannot take care of them and whose need for care has come to the attention of child welfare agency staff. While in foster care, children may live with relatives, with foster families, or in group facilities.



Over 10,000 children in Michigan are fostered. "We are asking our members to bring in underwear, socks, diapers, and pajamas to our regular meetings, but this is a project that the whole community can participate in," said Connie Shelton, President of the Rochester Lions. "Sometimes foster children are delivered to foster homes bringing nothing but the clothes on their backs. This drive provides them with some immediate necessities to help transition into their new temporary homes."

Drop boxes for donated items were available at the Rochester Hills Public Library, Cedar Brook Senior Living and Eugenia's 3rd Street Hair Gallery, which are in downtown Rochester. These facilities were extremely generous in allowing the public to drop off items. "Foster children experience great stress being separated from their birth families and friends, for whatever reason," said David Meyers, President of the Rochester Hills Lions Club. "The lack of clean underwear and pajamas should not stress these children more."

Through this project, we harnessed the power of our service organizations and local businesses, all of whom share a passion for taking action and creating lasting change," said Rotary President Tim Duncan.

Rotary brings together a global network of volunteer business leaders dedicated to improving lives at local and international levels, from helping those in need in their communities to working toward a polio-free world. Founded in 1915, Kiwanis International clubs and members are dedicated to serving the world's children in 85 nations and geographic areas. Lions Clubs have strengthened local communities through hands-on service and humanitarian projects focused on supporting vision, the environment, childhood cancer, hunger, diabetes, and other pressing humanitarian needs to help address some of the biggest challenges facing humanity. Although all four local clubs are associated with their parent international organizations, the clothing necessities service project is designed to help foster children in 11 Foster Care Organizations within our area. "Kudos go to all on the successful "Necessities Drive!", indicated Rev. Dr. Kate Thoresen, Director of Faith Communities Coalition on Foster Care. "Thank you for having such a heart for our children who are part of the foster care system. Together we can all make a positive difference in their lives."

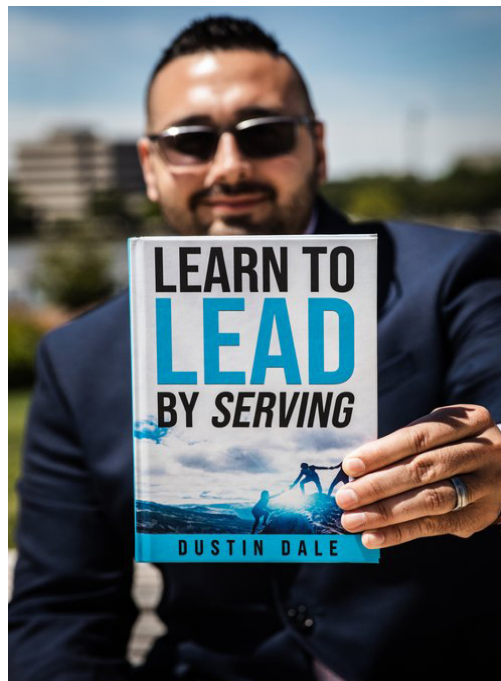

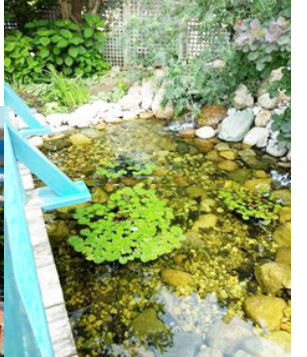

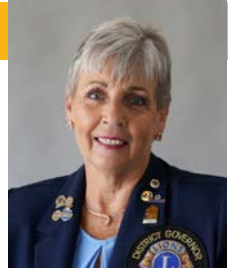
