Lions are continuing service in innovative ways. With the challenges presented this year our Lions are continuing service and model assessment, adaptation, innovation.

Our Messick Lions Club became a can-smacker extraordinaire. They went as far as the bridge collecting cans and then standing for hours at machines returning the cans. This money was used for food baskets. Harrison Lions Club set up a garage sale with proper precautions distancing and masked, which resulted in great success. The money went back into the community and was shared among several different programs.

Kingsley Lions Club practiced social distancing and safely held a white cane drive. They also work on bicycles in need of repair. With the help of the local bike shop and the skill of members they recondition bikes, giving them to children that do not have bikes based on schools or social worker's request. Christmas baskets and wreaths were sold and

the money use for food baskets. White Cloud Lions Club served over 300 Christmas dinners on Christmas Day in an event that was changed to a drive-through event. For those that were unable to pick up a dinner, club member made personal deliveries. Central Montcalm Lion Club packaged and delivered Christmas baskets to porches. The recipients were called and told of the time of delivery and notified when delivery could be expected.

These are just a few examples of the Lions at their best. It is easy to say "we can't do this because..." The Lions service spirit includes not saying "woe is me," but thinking of an alternate way to SERVE.

With Lions Clubs International being the largest service organization in the world, it is incumbent on us to safely do our part for our communities and the world.

All of Multiple District 11 have dedicated and hard working District Global Service Team Coordinators. They have reached out to their communities in spite of this pandemic.

GST Lion Michael Harper, 11 A1 was instrumental in encouraging and helping the clubs complete their donations of one thousand facial masks. Also, she assists her district with the various food bank projects and the Reading Action Program.

GST Lion Louvenia Shack-Seals, 11 B1 was extremely instrumental in assisting various clubs in her district with the completion of the mask donations project. Also, she helped her club, Quest South East Jackson Lion's, with different community membership drives, artwork contests for the youth and voter registrations. Additionally, Lion Kelly Lubbe, president and founder of the Jackson County Professional Virtual Lion's club was successful in writing a \$10,000 grant that allowed them to manufacture hand sanitizers for our first responders. Lion Kelly has worked on various other successful projects with their clubs. This shows you how you can be successful with teamwork.

GST Lion Amy Thackston, 11 B2 has been busy working with her clubs. She still found time to design a banner patch for districts/clubs that completed the mask donation project. Of course I'm going to ask her to design a few more for our other service projects. Also, she has encouraged and worked with the Portage Lion's club, which is the smallest club in her district. The president, Lion Elvira has proven that the size of the club doesn't matter if everyone is willing to serve. The Sight Conservation/White Cane Committee met to review applications for the 2021 White Cane Scholarships. The top three candidates will each be awarded a \$3,000 Scholarship, made possible through the Grace Lang Memorial Fund.

The fund was established in the late 70's through the estate of Grace Lang with the intention to use money to assist blind students to obtain their educational goals. Did you know the Michigan Forum originally called "The White Cane Symposium," and that a White Cane Scholarship Queen was appointed?

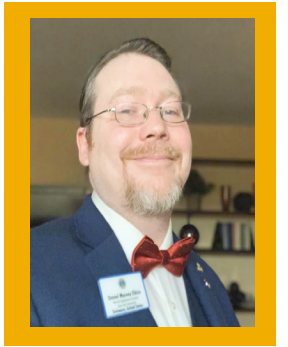
This year, the committee is proud to announce the following recipients of \$3,000 White Cane Scholarships:

Austin Clarke -attends Western Michigan University and is pursuing a career in fashion merchandising. Austin doesn't let his visual impairment hold him back from anything. He is an ice skater and a member of the WMU waterski team. He organized the "Skate to See" fundraiser, helping to raise \$1,500.00 for retinal research. Famous around high school and WMU as the guy with the cool sneakers, he realized fashion merchandising was his calling. "Many people may think that living with a visual impairment is unbearable, and it may feel like it at times, but living with one gives me a chance to prove everyone wrong, including myself. Overcoming things is a great feeling and I will never stop no matter how many obstacles get in my way. I am honored to share my story with you."

Elizabeth Dunn - is pursuing a Master's Degree in Social Work at Western Michigan University. Blind since birth, Elizabeth states this has become a positive characteristic that helps her observe and move through the world in her own unique way. She is committed to advocate for the increased positive representation, inclusion and equity of all people in minority groups. Her volunteer experiences include helping young blind children learn adaptive living skills, and she will use her creative talents to advocate for the representation of blind people in the Grand Rapids artistic community as well as the city's ArtPrize events. The resources of this scholarship will aid in her journey to help others through her Master's in Social Work.

Victor Marques - is a graduate assistant at Western Michigan University while in his second year of pursuing a Master of Arts degree in Vision Rehabilitation Therapy at WMU. Victor lost his vision in 2010 due to a diagnosis of Retinitis Pigmentosa. He is a professional musician, has held leadership roles as club president and vice-president of Toastmasters in the Portage area, and has been asked to serve as finance director to assist the Renewed Hope Free Health Clinic in Allegan. Victor has taught himself the necessary skills to become independent and has become proficient in braille reading and writing. This scholarship will aid in the purchase of specialized equipment to assist him with his career and daily communications. Upon graduation this year, Victor will work with transition age youth and adults pursuing success in education and/or attaining their vocational goals.

Michigan Lions Virtual Forum Session Highlight:

LIONS SERVING SAFELY!

The Fremont Lions Club has held a program to help students from two public school districts, identified by teachers of having possible vision problems, receive free complete eye exams and glasses if needed, at Ferris State University College of Optometry. This was possible through a generous grant from the Fremont Area Community Foundation.

During the 2019 SINE Program 74 students from the Fremont Public and Hesperia Community School Districts went to Ferris State University Michigan College of Optometry to have eye exams on December 5, 2019. Of the 74 students who participated 58 required eyeglasses. This represents 78 percent of the participants needing glasses which is a higher percentage than the 2015 and 2017 SINE Programs. Of the 74 students examined, this was the first eye exam ever for 26 students (35%).

The impact of the 2019 SINE Program is to correct the vision problems of young students so that they will have the ability to enjoy their maximum learning potential in their Fremont and Hesperia classrooms. In addition, by increasing the number of students receiving comprehensive eye exams and eyeglasses, the SINE Program will educate parents and the community on the critical importance of good vision and the resulting improvements in academic performance, and thus encouraging parents to access eye care services for their children annually through local eye care professionals.





GLOBAL LEADERSHIP MD11 CHAIR IPDG MICHAEL SCOTT



In the face of inevitable challenges and a still-uncertain set of risks, leadership is rightly concerned about how their clubs/districts will be affected and what they have to do next. We recognize that clubs are in different phases of dealing with the outbreak - therefore, the impacts vary. Nevertheless, of the extent of the virus's effect on a group, believe three fundamental qualities of strong leadership distinguish successful leaders as they guide their team through the Covid-19 crisis.

Courage - Courage is a defining trait of a leader. Think of great American leaders such as George Washington, Frederick Douglass, and others: They all looked a situation in the eye, acknowledged their fear, and decided to carry on anyway. In times of crisis, it may be tempting to bury your head in the sand.

Competence - In times of crisis, individuals look to trusted leaders and mirror their behaviors. But to win trust, leaders must show competence. In such situations, leaders should exhibit competence by relying on expert opinions and maintaining a sense of calm. During times like these, "emotional competence" is just as important as tactical competence.

Communication - Open communication is critical, but be thoughtful and rigorous about the information you share. Spreading inaccurate or incomplete information only escalates worry. Utilize reliable sources such as the Centers for Disease Control and local health departments to share relevant and timely communication with your teams.

Maintaining open, ongoing communication during times like these is critical to not only keep the business going but also from a teambuilding standpoint. Check-in regularly to discuss projects and remind each other that you are a team, and together you will get through this.

Strong communication can result in more involved members, shorter meetings, and an overall better understanding of its vision. As in the case of my career, IT professionals are no strangers to working remotely – many of my companies employees thrive on it – but now is an excellent time to revisit how our methods of providing service are and if some improvements or enhancements can be made without further disrupting the service we do.

In the current crisis, leaders must act in a similar fashion — giving their team direction and reminding them what they do matters. The new mission can be as simple as helping all members navigate this crisis as effectively as possible.

3. The International Convention has now gone virtual. With the potential tens of thousands of our members that would transcend in Montreal, Quebec, it would not be safe. The board recognizes the value of our members safety and while we realize there is no way to completely allow our members to feel the experience of an international convention, we are offering the next best thing, a virtual convention. 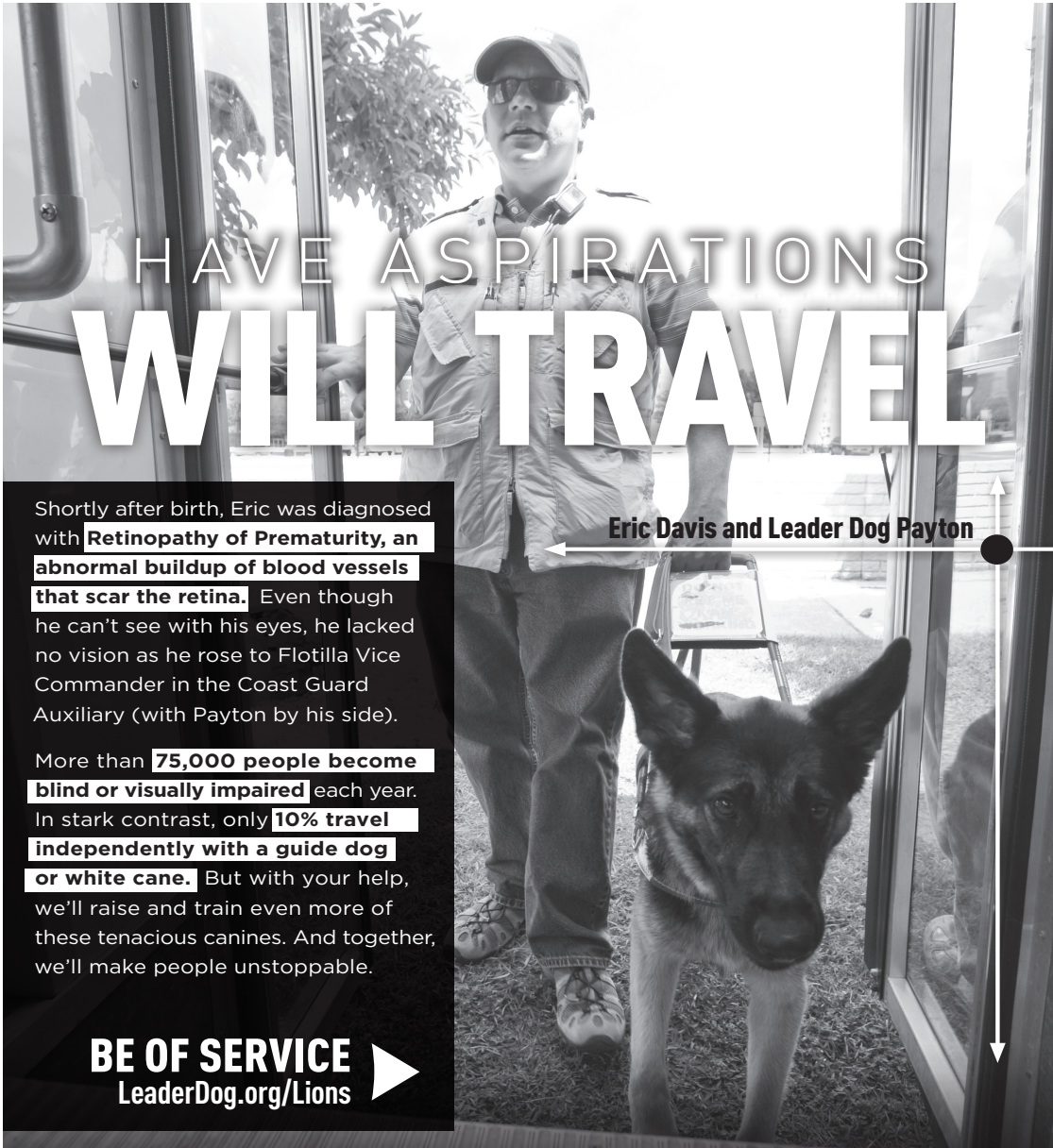

- 1) Back to Class: Providing In-Home Service- With an increase in COVID cases nationwide, we made the decision to continue guide dog and Orientation & Mobility training through home delivery for the months of December and January. We are monitoring the status of the pandemic closely and will make the determination to resume on-campus training as soon as it is safe to do so. When we resume, we will continue to adhere to the strict safety protocols we followed in the fall including: social distancing, 2:1 ratio of client to guide dog mobility instructor (GDMI) versus the usual 4:1 ratio, and operating at 50% class capacity so we can use every other residence hall room.
- 2) TOM Talks: Summer Experience for Teens (camp for kids blind or visually impaired) went virtual this past year. It was so successful we will be rolling out TOM Talks. Based on the popular TED Talks podcasts, this will be Technology, Orientation and Mobility Talks. Designed for young adults who are blind or visually impaired, our focus will be on the next steps for independent travel, professional readiness, and networking. To accommodate busy schedules, this program is partially self-guided and partially live.
- 3) Virtually Connected: Please encourage clubs and districts to reach out to their Leader Dog chair/trustee or to the Lions Team at Leader Dog for a virtual presentation! We can share the Lions legacy with short virtual presentations to clubs and at district conventions. Give us a call or email and we can create a tailored program: LionsSupport@LeaderDog.org or call Lion Kathleen Breen at 888.777.5332 x2052.

Recent bad weather meant that none of the helicopter services were flying in southeast Michigan, making them unable to transport a patient from Hickman hospital in Adrian for hours, leading to a 6-hour delay in transporting a critically injured patient to Toledo. MICU immediately dispatched a 3-person crew and were enroute with the patient. The ventilator donated by the Bedford Lions Club kept the patient breathing as the crew managed his care with IV medications and other meds. I am proud of the skill and professionalism our members demonstrated in reacting quickly and undoubtedly saving a life in a different capacity than they are used to. Thank you, Bedford Lions for helping to save a life by providing the ventilator."

Fire Chief Adam Massingill identified the crew as FF/Critical Care Paramedic Shawn McBride along with FF/EMT Luke Fruchey and FF/EMT Mike Komorowski, and expressed his pride again, in the skill and professionalism demonstrated that day. Well done Bedford Lions Club!

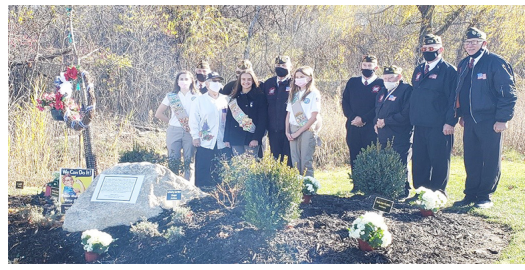

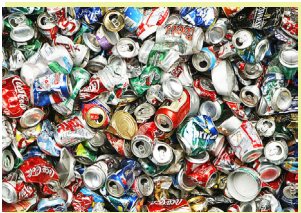

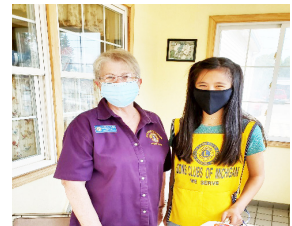
