The 2024-25 LCI Peace Poster theme selected was "Peace Without Limits."



READING ACTION PROGRAM PDG DON SPINKS CHAIR

For all our present and future District Governors:

Having a district reading project could ignite a world of reading passion within your district. Recently I was invited to district 11D1's Fall Convention to talk about the Reading Action Program.

There was powerful and personal testimony given on how important a reading program is. I would also like to thank Governor VanTol for inviting me. When you show that you care about the education of old and young, you start a trend within your Lions clubs to do the same.

If you are not aware, the State of Michigan is dealing with a major literacy crisis in its schools—with over 50% of all third-grade students reading below grade level. This troubling statistic is one of the reasons why our legislature recently passed the "Read by Grade Three" law; a law that places a major emphasis on early literacy in our schools, in hopes of increasing the number of children reading at or above grade level.

I had a video created recording me as District Governor in 2019/2020. I launched a reading program challenging all the 11D2 Lions clubs to take the book of my choice and read it to all third graders within their school district. I contacted Little Brown Books For Children and shared my idea. They in turn sent me 49 books for free. I gave each club enough books to cover their school districts. The title of the book I chose was Hello Lighthouse, a Caldecott winner. Clubs would read the book and take pictures or videos of them reading in class. I challenge all District Governors and future District Governors to jump on board with this program. Strengthening our students' reading skills must be a Lion priority!

GLOBAL SERVICE CHAIR IPDG STEVE MURCH

As was discussed in the space a few months ago, our goal is to have 100 percent of our clubs reporting service. The ultimate goal is to have 100 percent of our clubs' reporting 100 percent of their service.

A pipedream? Sure, but what good is setting

goals if they are so easy a caveman could do it (sorry for the Geiko reference, but those ads have made a comeback).

Let's set a couple of New Year's resolutions when it comes to service. They are easily attainable; they just take a little effort.

First, as we head toward a new calendar year – and we are halfway through the Lions year – here's hoping our clubs make reporting service a priority. As of December 10, 61 percent of our clubs in the multi-district have reported service for this Lions year. We have been gaining momentum the past two months with our clubs reporting service.

You ask what the big deal is with reporting service, so I'll use words from International to help explain it:

"For every club, service reporting benefits include:

- * Enabling stronger club communications
- * Demonstrating your club's effectiveness
- * Providing insight to current and future Lion leaders."

The second resolution is to try and have every club submit a service project for the Kindness Matters Service Award. Make each of our districts select a project to be voted on by the Council of Governors next year.

This year the CoG had an easy task, there was one entry, and they simply had to approve it. Last year there were two, which made it twice as difficult but still relatively easy.

If there are 35 clubs in your district, hopefully there are 35 entries. And if there aren't but your club does submit one, then your club's odds increase. It would be great to have 10 applications representing each of our district in MD

There is still plenty of time to do that kind of service; plenty of time to make a difference. Plus, your club is already doing service, so why not aim for a recognition. While we don't do it for any glory, it's always nice to know that someone is watch and appreciates what we do.


Serving Together has new meaning this year for DG Carl and 1st VDG

YOUTH CAMPS & EXCHANGE PROGRAM BY: LION ELVIE MARFIL, MD 11 STATE CHAIR

Michigan Lions Youth Camps & Exchange





Camp Dilemma:

In August 2024, we reserved a week-long stay at Lions Bear Lake Camp. However, in October, I was informed via email that the camp could only accommodate us for three days. As per Lions International requirements, a youth camp stay must last at least 10 days. We had already adjusted our schedule to a reduced six-day stay but unfortunately had no choice but to decline the three-day option.

Note: If you know of any camps that may be suitable, please let me know. Outgoing Participants Interested in experiencing life in a different country? Join the exchange program where you can participate in the day-to-day life of a local family and meet other students from around the world.

Filing deadlines for all applicants vary by country. Most Countries have a filing deadline range from February 15 to March 30 depending on the country you pick. Please choose your country early and contact us right away.

A \$100 Youth Exchange Supplies fee is required with all applications. Fee includes shirt, backpack, MD11 Youth Exchange pins and banners and orientation booklet. There may be additional charges for camps within your chosen country that are not included in the price of our program. You will be required to purchase your own airfare and international travel insurance. The travel insurance must be accepted in the country you are visiting.

Age requirements are typically 15 - 21

Our students usually depart the U.S. the last weekend of June or beginning of July for a 3 to 4 week stay depending on the Youth Exchange program in those countries. Please note that all countries are on a first come basis and fill up fast so the sooner you apply the sooner we can confirm your acceptance.





PR MARKETING GRANT FROM INTERNATIONAL APPROVED

As state PR/Marketing Chair, MD11, Lion Doug Klein, submitted proposal for an enhanced Lions of Michigan public relations effort for 2024-2025 was approved by the Marketing Committee of Lions International. They have already disbursed \$10,000 of the \$15,000 grant to Lions of Michigan.

We are now putting together a public relations campaign we are calling "Localeyes." The grant will cover the costs of having a professional Michigan-based public relations agency assist us in developing and disseminating publicity materials that will help in boosting our visibility in more local TV media news markets in Michigan.

2025 LIONS OF MI SCHOLARSHIP FOR THE VISUALLY IMPAIRED 2025 White Cane Scholarship Applications available! SIGHT CONSERVATION/WHITE CANE

Hey Lions! It's that time of year, when not only the leaves falling (or have fallen) from the trees ,college football teams are battling it out on the gridiron, and yes, the Lions of Michigan White Cane Scholarship applications are available for distribution.

The State Sight Conservation/White Cane Committee is committed to supporting the educational needs of students with blindness or visual impairments seeking a secondary education. To that end, the Lions of Michigan distribute 4 scholarships of \$3000 each year to deserving students who are blind or visually impaired. These scholarships are targeted toward secondary education, and the funds can be used based on the needs of the student. Many use the funds for tuition, books, or equipment such as braille writers, readers, etc. The main requirement for application is residency in the state of Michigan, acceptance to an institution of higher learning, and a diagnosed visual impairment. Other requirements are listed on the application.

The funding comes from the Grace Lang Memorial fund. The Grace Lang fund was established in the late 70's through the estate of Grace Lang with the intention to use the funds to assist blind students to obtain their educational goals. Because we have had more deserving students apply, the committee was able to secure additional funding to offer a 4th scholarship in 2024.

An accessible, fillable PDF form can be easily used by students using screen readers or other assistive devices. Previous versions were not as compatible and might require assistance from a sighted individual to help fill out the application. Thanks to Lion Charis Austin (District C-1) of the committee for creating this form. It is available on the Lions of Michigan Website (Link below).

If you know of students who are blind or visually impaired, and would need this scholarship, please refer them to the Lions of Michigan Website or the state office. Electronic copies are available to the district White Cane representatives (from each District) who are asked to forward to those who could use the scholarship in their respective areas.

Please note, there is some information gathering to be done to apply for this scholarship, and the deadline for submission is January 12, 2025.

- 6. Must have a minimum GPA of 2.5 (transcript required).
- 7. Completed scholarship applications must be postmarked NO LATER THAN JANUARY 12 2025
- 8. Must attend the Lions of Michigan Forum to accept scholarship during a ceremonial presentation. (Actual check(s) will be issued to the school/university/equipment manufacturer upon submission of documentation.) Two weeks notice required.




The Oscoda Lions Club ramp crew completed yet another ramp for a resident of Alcona
