


DISTRICT COVERNOR SPOTLICHT DG JULIE MAYUIERS 11 B2

Our district has tried to think outside the box this past year with ways of holding fundraisers to continue to do what we do best...."WE SERVE"! There have been drive-thru soup suppers, spaghetti dinners and corned beef and cabbage dinners to name a few. Holiday food and toy distributions continued for many clubs as well. Drive-thru Easter Bunny events started things off last Spring and continued this

year. Our Leos have also been busy with Christmas caroling at homes, Jelly Bean baskets for Easter and food basket distributions.



Despite all of the restrictions our clubs have still managed to stay active and in communication with their members. Some clubs went to Zoom meetings while some clubs chose to take a hiatus from meetings for the winter months. But things are starting to change and clubs are starting to hold small in-person meetings and planning for Summer events to take place with guidelines in place obviously.

I am very proud of all the clubs in B2 that helped out with both of these events!!! Smiles will be put on many faces both her and abroad by their generosity.

The future is looking like fundraisers are getting back on track while still keeping social distancing in mind with more spaghetti dinner drive-thru's, Ox Roast and Ham & Bean soup drive-thru's and Magic Week festivities to name a few.

USA LIONS CLUB "CARDS OF ENCOURAGEMENT" PROJECT

THIS spring the USA Lions club started a "Cards of Encouragement" project for elderly people in care homes.....

We realized as a club that many elderly people had been isolated from seeing family and relatives due to the pandemic environment. I heard



of one man who had not actually "seen" his wife in a year, so we purchased some packs of beautiful cards from Usborne books (who do cards for a cause fund raisers) we bought 20 boxes (and duly received half the cost back from Usborne books.)

Our club then took a little time to write out words of encouragement, humor, spiritual encouragement etc (30 cards per club member), they were then bought back in at our next meeting, we put 15 cards at a time in an envelope with a covering letter/explanation to 40 different care homes in our local area. This is one of those projects that we may never really see first-hand – the reaction of some of those people. However several years ago we did something similar as a district project at our convention, and we did get several responses from carers who said that it really lifted people up and they got smiles. Several of them kept the cards in view for quite a while.

Even though many Leo Clubs have not been able to meet over the past year, there are Leos who have been Actively providing service in their communities. Presently there are about 30% of the

Leo Clubs who have been able to do activities even though their schools have been in session virtually!

International Board of Directors Approves Revised Dues Adjustment Resolution

Lions Clubs International supports clubs and members around the world so we can advance our global mission of service together. Our international support and the work of Lions Clubs International is fueled by the international dues of our incredible members.

In recent years, it has become increasingly clear that the services Lions Clubs International has been able to provide to members with the available budget is no longer in line with what Lions need and expect.

The International Board of Directors voted in October 2019 to approve an international dues adjustment resolution that would be voted on at the 2020 International Convention, but it was canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The board recently approved a new dues adjustment model that will be voted on at the 2021 International Convention.

The Board of Directors undertook an extensive review of Lions Clubs International's financials, including the implementation of substantial budget reductions. After much consideration, the board proposed to adjust dues by \$7 over a three-year period.

Under the proposal, international dues would be adjusted according to the following schedule:

\$3 increase on July 1, 2022 \$2 increase on July 1, 2023 \$2 increase on July 1, 2024

Why an international dues adjustment is needed?

We realize the association has been reluctant to adjust dues over the years, and we have not adjusted international dues since 2011. The proposed adjustment will help cover our costs and allow us to suitably serve our members' needs. With that said, the Board of Directors did not take this issue lightly, nor are we minimizing the value of each dollar that our members contribute.

A dues adjustment will allow Lions Clubs International to provide improved support to Lions and to continue to invest in improving programs and digital products such as our website and MyLion. It will also allow us to invest in new programs such as the Learning Management System (LMS), development of new curriculum such as digital literacy, training videos, global advertising, marketing automation, digital and video storytelling and others tools and initiatives that will enhance our impact, our brand and our membership.

There are many ways to serve the membership of MD 11. Participating as a district representative on one of our many State Committees is one of several opportunities.

Below is a list of all State Committees. In addition to committee members, some of the State Chairperson terms will expire June 30, 2020.




